Itinerary Highlights

Experience the extraordinary privilege of journeying through Inuit Nunangat, the land of Inuit, a homeland of ice, water, and land.

Cross the Arctic Circle as you sail the 190-kilometre (118 miles) length of Kangerlussuaq Fjord (Søndre Strømfjord).

Cruise among icebergs at Ilulissat Icefjord, a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Spend two days searching for marine life in Tallurutiup Imanga, one of Canada's largest National Marine Conservation Areas.

Enjoy the opportunity to see polar bears, seabirds, and other Arctic wildlife in pristine natural environments.

Retrace the historic route of European explorers, who for centuries searched their way through ice in hopes of finding a sailing route through the passage.

Transit Ikirahaq (Bellot Strait), the narrow and dramatic waterway at the very northern tip of continental North America.

Daily Itinerary

Day 1 Kangerlussuag, Greenland

Arrivals in Kangerlussuaq, Greenland. Ship embarkation and cross the Arctic Circle.

Kangerlussuaq is a former United States Air Force base and Greenland's primary flight hub. Arriving via charter flight from Toronto, we will transfer to the "Ocean Endeavour", travelling by Zodiac.

With 190 kilometres (118 miles) of superb scenery, Kangerlussuaq Fjord (Søndre Strømfjord) is one of the longest fjords in the world. We will begin our adventure taking in the views offered by sailing down this dramatic fjord and will cross the Arctic Circle as we go.

Day 2 and 3 Sisimiut

Explore vibrant Sisimiut.

Colourful Sisimiut is Greenland's second-largest city. We will overnight in port, allowing two days to explore this vibrant city. Discover treasures in the city's extensive museum with its towering whalebone archway at the entrance. Be sure to take time to stop in at the artisan's studio for the chance to purchase outstanding handicrafts. Traditional qajaq (kayaking) is in

resurgence here, and there's plenty of other fun outdoor activities for the adventurous to enjoy.

Day 4 Ilulissat

Towering icebergs and more.

Experience the remarkable beauty of Ilulissat Icefjord, located 250 kilometres (155 miles) north of the Arctic Circle, and renowned for its enormous icebergs. Ilulissat means "iceberg", an apt name for this site at the outlet of the Sermeq Kujalleq glacier. It is a UNESCO World Heritage site and the source of many of the icebergs seen in the North Atlantic.

The sheer size and grandeur of the towering ice formations is breathtaking as you take in the view during a stroll along the boardwalk. They are truly a sight to behold.

Visit the town, with its captivating museums, charming cafés, craft shops, and bustling fishing harbour. The Ilulissat Icefjord Centre is a must-see, where you can delve into the fascinating narratives surrounding the ice and gain a deeper appreciation for this awe-inspiring natural wonder.

Day 5 Western Greenland

Hike the tundra.

Making the most of the weather and wildlife conditions of the day, we will explore by ship and Zodiac along the west coast of Greenland, with numerous options for expedition stops.

Whether you're setting foot on land, cruising by Zodiac, or out on the ship's deck, you'll have plenty of opportunities to learn alongside expert geologists, naturalists, and marine biologists. And, with Inuit expedition team members at your side, you'll gain an intimate perspective on the abundant flora and fauna you encounter.

Take a moment to savour the tranquility and absorb the knowledge and stories shared by Inuit cultural educators, which will deepen your connection to this breathtaking landscape.

Departing Greenland, we will cross Baffin Bay toward Nunavut.

Day 6 At sea in the Davis Strait

Learn from Inuit in their homeland.

As we sail toward Nunavut, this is an excellent time to enjoy workshops, watch a documentary, or get out on deck. Our expedition team will be available with insights to deepen your understanding of the Arctic. Be sure to keep your binoculars ready for minke and humpback whales, as well as for

seabirds that are sure to mark our passage.

Our sea day will offer the unique opportunity to learn from Inuit in their homeland, gaining a better understanding of the daily lives of people who live in the regions we are visiting. Enjoy cultural performances and maybe even participate in Inuit games, or sample country food.

Through these shared experiences and interactions, develop a deep appreciation for the region's vibrant culture and gain a profound connection to the stunning landscapes we are traversing.

Day 7 Mittimatalik (Pond Inlet), NU, Canada

Experience Inuit culture.

We will spend our day in Mittimatalik, a busy Arctic community in a beautiful setting. With stunning views of nearby Bylot Island, we will explore the town, viewing its landscape, and shopping for unique handcrafted souvenirs of our visit.

The talented Tununiq Arsarniit Theatre Group will present us with a cultural

performance that features drum dancing, throat singing, and storytelling.

Day 8 and 9 Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound) and Devon Island Seek whales, seabirds, and Polar bears.

We will spend three days exploring Tallurutiup Imanga (Lancaster Sound), one of the newest National Marine Conservation Areas in Nunavut. Narwhal, beluga and bowhead whales transit and feed in this area.

Cruising by ship and Zodiac, we will be joined by expert biologists and ecologists as we explore the region in search of wildlife. Learn more about the crucial role Inuit play in conserving the vibrant biodiversity of these waterways and the enduring connection between the ocean and Inuit.

On the northern border of Tallurutiup Imanga lies Devon Island. At over 50,000 square kilometres (31,000 square miles), it is the largest uninhabited island on Earth. Flat-

topped mountains, glacial valleys, and a substantial ice cap give Devon Island its unique character. We'll visit the island and hike the tundra, visit archaeological sites and the remains of an RCMP and Hudson's Bay Company site at Dundas Harbour, cruise a glacier face, and seek wildlife from ship and on shore.

Day 10 Beechey Island

Visit a Franklin Expedition historical site.

In 1845, Sir John Franklin set out from England with his ships HMS "Erebus" and HMS "Terror", in an attempt to sail through the Northwest Passage. His crew overwintered at Beechey Island, where three of his men died.

Numerous search parties later used Beechey as a depot and rendezvous, and explorers Amundsen, Bernier, and Larsen each visited the island. Thomas Morgan of the HMS "Investigator" was buried here in 1854 alongside Franklin's men. On the island, the graves and ruins of Northumberland House are a haunting memorial.

Day 11 Prince Regent Inlet

Enjoy birdwatching and Zodiac cruising.

This passage marks an area rich in marine and avian life. Thick-billed murres, ivory gulls, beluga whales, narwhal, and bowhead whales reside in the inlet's ice-strewn waters. In addition to abundant wildlife, the inlet offers an intriguing legacy connected to the exploration of the Northwest Passage and mercantile efforts of the Hudson's Bay Company.

Day 12 Ikirahaq (Bellot Strait)

Witness the most northerly point of continental North America.

Today, we will arrive at the famed Bellot Strait, a narrow passage separating Somerset Island from the Boothia Peninsula. As we sail through this two-kilometre (1.2-miles)-wide waterway, we will enjoy the unique opportunity of reaching the northernmost part of mainland North America.

On our sail, keep watch for an array of enchanting marine mammals from beluga whales to narwhals and seals.

Today's expedition will allow us to delve deeper into the region's fascinating history and learn about Joseph René Bellot, the French naval officer and Arctic explorer who joined an 1850s expedition in search of Sir John Franklin.

Day 13 to 16 Kitikmeot region

Sail the Northwest Passage.

Navigate the mysterious waters of this infamous waterway with an eye out for local wildlife. Although this is Nunavut's least-populated region, wildlife abounds here both in the sea and on land.

Our journey through the Northwest Passage will include a visit to a local community where Inuit hosts will share their knowledge of their home, land, and the area's history.

Discover the legacy of this important waterway and the captivating story of Roald Amundsen, who overwintered in the bay for two years while in search of the Northwest Passage. Gain insights into the triumphs of explorers like Amundsen and the vital role that Inuit knowledge played in successful passage crossings.

Day 17 Kugluktuk, NU, Canada

Wave a fond farewell.

Located at the mouth of the Coppermine River, Kugluktuk is the westernmost community in Nunavut. Known for many years as Coppermine, the community reverted to its original Inuinnaqtun name – meaning "place of moving waters" – on January 1, 1996.

Today we will disembark the "Ocean Endeavour" and make our way to the airport to meet our charter flight to Yellowknife, NT, where our trip officially ends.

Note: Iqaluktuuttiaq (Cambridge Bay), NU, is an alternate disembarkation point, and may be used based on sea, ice, and weather conditions.
