Learning from objects

Look at the cup on the screen. What do you observe? For this part of the activity, we're not making guesses about what we see. We're just focusing on the facts. What is it? What colours do you see? What details do you notice?

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An inference is an **educated guess** that we make based on **clues we observe** from an object.

Take another look at the cup. Based on what you observed, what guesses can you make about the object and the person who owned it? What are the clues that made you make each guess?

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What are some questions you still have? What do you still wonder?
